Departing from the usual procedure of holding a formal business meeting, a strictly informal "stern session" led by president, Tamako Inouye, was held in the hopes of bringing forth constructive criticisms and of clarifying any misunderstanding in regards to the Gyujo Kai organization.

Meeting opened with the reading of some of the highlights of the Freshmen themes. The president commented on the fact that freshmen themes tend to criticize the same points year in and year out; therefore, some steps should be taken to remedy this situation.

As long as so much of the Nisei student functions have been curtailed, the floor was opened to any new suggestions to promote interest in the club. In line with this Tamako announced the formation of two new committees; the outdoor activities committee headed by Sachiko Kodama and Yukie Fukuyawa will try to arrange an interesting series of outdoor activities so that students can better acquaint themselves. The other is the Domestic and Foreign Affairs Committee which is being undertaken by Marguerite Fukami whose duty will be to plan discussion groups. Sachiko announced that the first outing is being planned for Feb. 22, and asked all members interested to sign up.

Giving of book reports, radio programs and play reports were also suggested to make meetings more stimulating.

The topic of a central meeting place for Gyujo Kai was brought up. New members were informed that the reserve fund had been accumulating for a time when Gyujo Kai girls would realize their dreams of a club house, but that thus far it has been impractical to purchase or rent a house. It was decided that housing investigations undertaken previously, be brought out to

acquaint the girls with some of the steps which have been taken in that direction.

Since the acquiring of a House seemed now to be something of the remote future, the question of what should be done with ^{the fund} it came up for discussion. Girls were in favor of using the reserve fund for the purchase of bonds, one \$500 bond and two \$50 bonds maturity value. This would leave about \$100 in the bank. The Alumni group is to be consulted before any further action is taken on this matter.

Other suggestions for activities were: splash parties at Women's Gym, singing of songs at meetings, reading of the constitution so that girls would be familiar with it.

Toshiko Hiroshige, new vice-president, passed out cards requesting each girl to sign name, class, address, phone, outside activities, and committees on which she would be interested in working.

Bearing proof that the club has accomplished something during the past months, the Fuyo Kai paper (The Fuyo Kai Fulcrum) edited by Theresa Honda and her staff, and the Fuyo Kai directory managed by Hide Okazaki were distributed.
